College Combines Past, Present, Future With Grand Opening of \$5 Million Renovated Library April 2

n connection with the 55th anniversary of the creation of Jefferson College by Jefferson County voters in 1963, the College will host a public grand opening for the renovated Library on Monday, April 2, from 3-5 p.m. on the Hillsboro campus.

Everyone is welcome to attend. Advance reservations are not necessary.

The event will include a short dedication ceremony at 3 p.m. followed by tours of the new facility, interactive demonstrations, historical and construction document displays, information regarding the Jefferson County 200th Bicentennial Celebration, music, refreshments, and giveaways.

The \$5 million renovation, which began in late 2016, has been possible thanks to a \$1.7 million appropriation by the Missouri legislature for capital projects and an ongoing \$1.5 million campaign by the Jefferson College Foundation.

"The significance of the Library to campus and the surrounding community cannot be overstated," said Jefferson College President Dr. Raymond Cummiskey. "Campus and community input during the planning and visioning process helped define the renovated space. These improved spaces will enhance the College's

ability to deliver better experiences for students and visitors alike, while providing for a more

energy-efficient building, which will reduce the cost

of maintenance and extend its life."

The 50-year old Library and its services were reimagined in a fresh, contemporary effort to improve user experiences and educational resources as the informational, study/research, and community hub of the Hillsboro campus. Since its construction in 1967 as one of the first buildings on the Hillsboro campus, technology and the utilization needs of Library services and spaces have advanced significantly. The facility had not had any major construction or comprehensive renovation since it was built.



In connection with Jefferson College's 55th anniversary, the College will host a public grand opening for the \$5 million newly renovated Library on Monday, April 2, from 3-5 p.m. on the Hillsboro campus. Everyone is welcome to attend. The event will include activities for all ages.

New and improved features of the Library include:

- Increased access to technology
- More quiet and collaborative spaces
- Efficient, safe, sustainable, and accessible construction and furnishings
- Expanded Jefferson County History Center
- Designated space for early childhood education collection
- Larger bibliographic instruction room
- Additional electrical outlets and device stations

A rectangular design for the West entrance was selected, blending the design of the entrance on the East and allowing the College to look to the future while embracing the past. Dynamic features of the interior include bright finishes and abundant natural light, a completely new Library and Testing Center layout, relocation of the Jefferson County History Center, technology provisions, additional quiet and collaborative spaces, more seating options, more outlets for personal digital devices, more desktop computers, and triple the number of study rooms.

Beyond modernizing the Library's study and collaborative spaces and enhancing essential services for students, faculty, staff, and the community, the project included replacement of the HVAC system and windows which were original to the building from the 1960s.






College President Cummiskey Announces Retirement in 2020

fter leading Jefferson College since 2009 as president, Dr. Raymond Cummiskey has announced that he will retire at the completion of his existing contract on June 30, 2020. He is the seventh president in the 55-year history of the institution and will be the second longest serving president in the College's history.







Under his leadership, the College has sustained a high quality learning environment and expanded educational sites and facilities in Imperial and Arnold, added programs in high demand areas such as health care and online technology, established a Campus Police Department and implemented numerous campus safety initiatives, brought facilities and infrastructure up to date, and created a dynamic planning process to guide the College for many years to come. The College has also launched economic development and workforce training initiatives that have deepened relationships and partnerships with local, county, St. Louis and regional Chambers of Commerce, elected officials, and community-serving organizations.

Currently, the College is in the final stages of a \$5 million renovation to the Hillsboro campus Library that will significantly improve user experiences and educational resources. Next spring, the institution will undergo its 10-year re-accreditation evaluation by the Higher Learning Commission.

"For the past nine years, Dr. Cummiskey has faithfully served Jefferson College and the people of Jefferson County," said Board of Trustees President Steve Meinberg. "He has been a great friend to many in our community and is a quality servant. We are grateful for his leadership and contributions, and his role in the College's history will not be forgotten. The entire Board of Trustees respects his decision and wishes him and his family the best in retirement."

"It has been a tremendous honor and privilege to serve as president," said Cummiskey. "I owe a huge debt of gratitude to everyone who has worked and sacrificed to make Jefferson College so successful and respected. Certainly any successes during my time as president are due to a tremendous team, engaged faculty and a supportive Board. I am grateful for the opportunity to have served as president of an institution that is truly the 'Jewel of the County'!"

In addition to being a well-respected voice for statewide and national higher education issues, Cummiskey has held leadership roles in numerous local and regional economic, workforce, community development, and civic groups.

"Careers in Teacher Education" Information Fair April 10



With first-hand insight, Walinsky will guide community discussions at both the Arnold and Hillsboro locations. Each event will allow the opportunity for attendees to meet Walinsky.

50 years ago, in the midst of war, domestic crisis, and a Presidential election, the United States lost within two months two of the nation's most dynamic and promising leaders, when first, Martin Luther King Jr., and then, Robert F. Kennedy, were assassinated. Kennedy had emerged as the election favorite, building a coalition that cut across all lines of race, age, opinion and social and economic class. He proposed a dramatic project of American renewal, grounded on personal action, peace, love and the wisdom born from tragedy, in his 1968 Presidential campaign.

King became the most visible spokesperson and leader in the Civil Rights Movement, widely known for his "I Have a Dream" speech. The day that Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated in Memphis, Kennedy absorbed the news of the killing and responded with courage, compassion and responsibility in his now infamous "Ripple of Hope" speech.

death rituals around the world.


Wesley Whitfield, Associate Professor of Chemistry and musician, will present his original percussion composition inspired by the Periodic Table of Elements.


