are all adaptations from the Greek New Comedy, a comedy of manners which succeeded the more boisterous, bawdy, and harshly satirical works of Aristophanes and his 5th Century B. C. Plautus was the most successful of all the Roman comic wrights. Twenty of his plays have survived to this day. The contemporaries. plays play-

Plautine farce, as in *The Menaechmi*, finds much of its comic appeal in what came to be stock devices; the artificial situation, a lie or mistake which is always clear to the audience; instead of surprise the comic irony of watching other characters who do not know.

Plautus apparently wrote as he did partly in consideration of his audience. Rome at this time was at war in Greece and Asia Minor. The returning soldiers wanted relaxation through a tense farce plot of scheming, suspense, and action that always turned out well in the end. Virtue triumphs. Primary concerns seem to be complicated by money, girls, and pleasure intermingled in a rather superficial plot scheming slaves, parasites, comic

Most all of these characteristics are present in tonight's tation of The Menaechmi.
