2018 Year in Review: College's Success Accentuated by Service, Leadership and Innovation

From the completion of an ambitious facility renovation project and the success of several committee-based initiatives involving staff and faculty from across the institution, *The Windjammer* invites you to celebrate some of the many significant accomplishments of 2018 that reflect continued excellence at Jefferson College.

Learning and Service Are Harbingers of Institutional Success



Over 830 students were eligible to receive associate degrees or career and technical education certificates during the 53rd annual commencement ceremonies in May. Dr. Rudy Yanuck, retired pathologist for the Department of Veteran Affairs in St. Louis, was the keynote speaker. Aside from the commencement events, a variety of technical education programs also held ceremonies to honor students via pinning and/or professional recognition: Area Technical School CNA, EMT, Law Enforcement Academy, Nursing, Occupational Therapy Assistant, and Radiologic Technology. Additionally, the College hosted a graduation ceremony for those who received their Hi-Set diploma.





The Board of Trustees' adopted new mission/vision/values statements to help guide the institution during the next five-year strategic planning process for 2020-2025 and well into the future. Approval of the new statements followed a year-long development process that included input from campus groups, community leaders, and area residents.



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To mark the completion of a \$5 million renovation to the Library, over 250 people attended the grand opening on April 2 in connection with the 55th anniversary of the establishment of the College. The Library and its services were reimagined in a fresh, contemporary effort to improve user experiences and educational resources as the informational, study/research, and community hub of the Hillsboro campus. The renovation, which began in late 2016, was possible through a combination of state appropriations, an ongoing capital campaign by the Jefferson College Foundation, and institutional resources.



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Psychology Professor Leslie Buck received recognition from the Missouri Department



of Higher Education for her service on the Core Curriculum Advisory Committee for MOTR Core42, a new statewide initiative that establishes a group of recognized courses guaranteed to transfer to any public college or university in Missouri to meet general education requirements.



To unify, coordinate, and better support institutional diversity and inclusion efforts, the Board of Trustees adopted an Inclusion and Diversity Plan as developed by the Diversity Subcommittee of the Accreditation Committee. The plan is based on the following diversity



statement: "Jefferson College is a community leader dedicated to supporting and promoting diversity through opportunities and experiences that foster a culture of respect, inclusiveness, and understanding for everyone in the campus community, to engage in a diverse world."



In preparation for a 2019 reaccreditation evaluation by the Higher Learning Commission, the accrediting body was highly complimentary of Jefferson College's Quality Initiative, an institution-wide, improvement project that began in 2013 focusing on implementing

an attendance and participation tracking system and using data from the system to improve student retention rates. "By engaging a wide variety of stakeholders through a standing committee structure, the College used the opportunity to leverage a positive and lasting culture shift," the HLC report noted.



In light of the ongoing emphasis and success of institution-wide planning efforts, the College implemented Strategic Planning Online (SPOL) software to sustain and support strategic planning across the College.



The Workforce Development and Continuing Education



Department was successful in securing significant state funding to support regional job training and workforce development training efforts through a variety of longstanding programs and new offerings such as the Construction and Mechanical Occupations (CAMO) Training Academy.

In an effort to provide non-perishable food, frozen/refrigerated goods, and personal hygiene items free of charge to students in need, the Vikings'



Vault food pantry opened in September as over 2,450 items were donated during the ribbon cutting event. Kudos to the Certified Professional Staff group for their role in suggesting and championing the project. The pantry's existence is due in large part to grants from the Missouri Scholarship and Loan Foundation, the Missouri High Education Loan Authority (MOHELA), the Jefferson College Foundation, along with a refrigeration/freezer unit donated by the Hussmann Corporation.





To mark Jefferson College's first-ever international student educational exchange program, organized by the Global Education Subcommittee, a group of 12 students and three instructors from Darmstadt, Germany, visited the College as part of an remarkable learning experience. The visitors observed and participated in several academic programs, viewed demonstrations and instructional technology, toured local factories/employers, job-shadowed department managers and directors at the College, and gave a symposium about aspects of their home country, all while forming friendships and learning about life in the United States. Jefferson College will send a delegation of students to Germany this summer.





Beyond sustaining the regional workforce as highly qualified personnel, the Law Enforcement Academy classes continued the consecutive streak of achieving a 100 percent pass rate on the POST (Peace Officer Standards and Training) license exam.



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In the first semester of embedding National Institute of Metalworking Skills (NIMS) credentials as part of its coursework, all eight Computer Integrated Manufacturing (CIM) students taking the NIMS Measurement Materials and Safety examination passed on their first attempt.



Many of the College's best and brightest students were recognized for their



outstanding scholastic achievement by being inducted into the College's Phi Theta Kappa and College/Area Technical School National Technical Honor Society.






To improve information and communication about the College's academic programs and numerous

educational services and activities, the Public

Relations and Marketing Department launched a redesigned website homepage. The site features a full-screen video, one-click access to all academic programs, eye-catching statistics and graphics, real-time calendar and news information. and easy access to all of the College's social media accounts.



With the sudden closure of Vatterott College locations across the region and country, Jefferson College stepped forward to offer degree options and other avenues to help students address the financial and academic burden. Staff provided oneon-one assistance to



develop personalized education plans in attempt to align Vatterott coursework with available options at Jefferson College.

Ties That Bind - Community Connectedness Strengthened Through Partnerships



The College adopted a Campus Compact Civic Engagement Plan to strengthen outreach and service-learning opportunities. It infuses civic engagement into the culture of the institution and builds a community of connection, caring, compassion, and service inside and outside the institution. Accordingly,



a cross-section of 88 faculty, staff, and students participated in the first-ever Day of Service as they dispersed across Jefferson County to provide needed assistance to 12 agencies and organizations throughout our community.





In advance of the midterm election, Jefferson College and the Jefferson County Growth Association hosted two public forums involving candidates in county, state, and federal races. College President Dr. Ray Cummiskey served as moderator. In related programming, the Jefferson College Library held a panel discussion titled "How to Spot Fake News in an Election Year" to provide tips and discuss the political, social, and technological background for "fake news."





In an effort to provide job-related resources and highlight the importance of manufacturing careers as an economic development and educational pathway



in our region, Jefferson College hosted the third annual Manufacturing Day to draw attention to the outstanding opportunities that a career in manufacturing can provide. The Employment Services Office also hosted a General Job Fair and Healthcare Job Fair to connect job seekers with numerous employers.





In connection with state and national legislative advocacy efforts, a delegation travelled to Jefferson City and Washington D.C. to confer with legislators about important issues surrounding higher education. Additionally, a group of Social Work students and faculty members from Jefferson College and Fontbonne University attended NASW Social Work Advocacy Day in Jefferson City as they visited with Representative Becky Ruth and Senator Paul Wieland to discuss issues important to the field of Social Work.



Radiologic Technology Program Director/Assistant Professor Janet Akers-Montgomery was named a Fellow in the Missouri Society of Radiologic Technologists, an honor that has only been awarded to nine Missouri radiologic technologists. She was also nominated to present the Annual Memorial Lecture titled "The Jaded Truth of our Radioactive Past." In addition, she received first place in the Technologist category for her scientific exhibit titled "Contrast Enhanced Mammography."



Former Missouri Governor Jay Nixon donated an extensive collection of arrowheads and artifacts by his family in honor of Jay's late father, Jeremiah "Jerry" Nixon. The unique collection has been historically preserved, displayed, and used for educational study.





Jefferson College and COMTREA once again partnered to host Take Back the Night, a



national event which seeks to end all forms of sexual and domestic abuse by striving to create safe communities and respectful relationships through awareness.




The Cultural Events and Outreach Committee organized an array


Science and the Science of Art; and Ripple of Hope: To Seek a Newer World.








The sixth annual Leader Holiday Dinner was another success, raising funds while showcasing winners of the paper's annual recipe contest served by students in the Culinary Arts program.





The annual Viking Classic Scholarship Golf Tournament at Fox Run Golf Club grossed \$49,000 for student scholarships



and included a \$1,000 guaranteed ball-drop.





To celebrate those who have made significant contributions to the Foundation, the annual Monticello Society recognition ceremony



honored several individuals, businesses and organizations for their philanthropic actions.



In grateful appreciation of those that made significant contributions to the Library Reimagined capital campaign, a special dinner and facility preview was held for elite donors. A Donor Honor Roll was also published to acknowledge the generosity of key donors toward the campaign.





Beyond their initial bequest of \$25,000, retired Foundation Executive Director Tom Burke and his wife, Vicki, made an additional bequest of \$150,000 plus 80 percent of their estate toward the Library Reimagined campaign.





to the team that displays outstanding sportsmanship throughout the season.






Softball Head Coach Tony Cook earned his 500th career victory.
