

Jefferson College Arts & Science Graduation – U.S. Air Force Serviceman Surprises Brother with Diploma Presentation

U.S. Air Force First Class Airman Mark Hendrix of Hillsboro surprised his brother, Logan Hendrix, by presenting the diploma during the Arts & Science Education ceremony as part of Jefferson College's 54th annual commencement ceremony on May 18.

Mark Hendrix has been stationed in England and the brothers had not seen each other since Logan began his education at Jefferson College. Mark flew overnight to attend the ceremony and was in uniform when he presented Logan's diploma.

The brothers' parents and grandparents were the only family members to know about the surprise visit and presentation during the commencement ceremony.





Logan Hendrix received an Associate of Arts degree as part



College Faculty Receive Awards for Teaching Excellence

Three faculty members at Jefferson College have been honored for their teaching excellence and effectiveness as award recipients for the 2019 academic year. They include English Associate Professor Shanie Latham, English Assistant Professor Amy Call, and Accounting Professor Dr. Mary Baricevic.



Shanie Latham

Emerson Electric Award for Teaching Excellence

Latham is the recipient of the Emerson Electric Award for Teaching Excellence. She has taught at Jefferson College since 2008. Latham has served on the Curriculum Committee (chair for two years), led a number professional development sessions through the Center for Teaching and Learning, and participated as a member of the Task Force to implement the Missouri Department of Higher Education's initiative for a corequisite model for English courses.

She earned a Bachelor of Arts in Media Studies from the University of Houston – Clear Lake in 1995, and a Master of Fine Arts in Creative Writing from Southern Illinois University Carbondale in 2008.

"My favorite place to be on campus is in a classroom full of energetic students," said Latham. "I love to watch people's worlds open up as they discover new ideas, new skills, and new confidence that they may never have known in themselves before."

When not serving students, Latham is Managing Editor at River Styx Literary Magazine (2009-20013 and 2018-present), and the Series Co-Editor of the New Stories from the Midwest Anthologies. She feels lucky to be surrounded by colleagues at Jefferson College who are as passionate about improving people's lives through education as she is.

Governor's Award for Excellence in Teaching

Call is the recipient of the Governor's Award for Excellence in Teaching. She recently completed her eighth year of teaching full-time at Jefferson College, having previously taught as adjunct faculty since 1990.

Anyone interested in attending Jefferson College can complete a variety of registration-related steps in one visit:

Apply to the College Apply for financial aid Take the placement test Meet with an academic advisor Register for classes (students must have test scores on file that are within the past two years) Receive a degree audit Get a student photo ID (free for first time students) Purchase a parking pass (\$10) Purchase textbooks

Limited walk-in advising is also available on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays. Students who prefer to make an appointment should call Enrollment Services at (636) 481-3209.

Summer classes begin on June 10 and fall classes begin on August 19. Among the available class formats and options are online, day, evening, hybrid (on site/online), and 4, 6, 8, and 16-week formats. Ron Scaggs Receives Lifetime Achievement Award from U.S. Department of Justice

Jefferson College Board of Trustees member Ron Scaggs, retired Law Enforcement Coordinator with the U.S. Attorney's Office in St. Louis, recently received the U.S. Department of Justice Lifetime Achievement Award for his distinguished career and numerous years of service to our country.

"This award is a small token of the United States Attorney's Office's appreciation for Ron's many years of hard work and loyalty," said Jeff Jensen, U.S. Attorney-Eastern District of Missouri.

Scaggs graduated from Crystal City High School and has degrees from Jefferson College, Maryville University, and St. Louis University.

His service to our country begin in 1965 with the U.S. Army in Vietnam, rising to the rank of Sergeant. In 1973, Scaggs became a patrol officer for the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department and worked for three years as a uniformed officer, four years as a homicide detective, and three years as an undercover officer on the vice squad. In 1984, he returned to Festus as Chief of Police where he served for 14 years.



For the past 18 years, Scaggs served as Law Enforcement Coordinator for the U.S. Attorney-Eastern District of Missouri, until his retirement in 2018. He is also the founder of the Leadership Academy at St. Louis University, which provides training and professional development to law enforcement managers and officers in Missouri and Illinois.

In addition to Jefferson College, Scaggs' community service includes the VFW, Festus Crystal City Rotary Club, and Twin City Chamber of Commerce. He also served as President of the Missouri Police Chiefs Association.

Archival Project Highlights Jefferson County History Center at College Library

As part of a four-year process in cooperation with the Jefferson County Circuit Court and the Jefferson College Library, the Missouri Secretary of State's Local Records Program recently completed an intensive effort to archive numerous 19th century Jefferson County Circuit Court case files.

Led by Missouri Secretary of State Field Archivist Bill Glankler and several volunteers, including Mary Blue of Cedar Hill, Karen Reecht of Crystal City, Carolyn Scott of De Soto, Molly Rose of Cedar Hill, and Lea Williams of Hillsboro, the group began processing the case files in August 2015 by working nearly every Thursday to prepare the files for preservation imaging.



Processing the records included unfolding, flattening, cleaning, arranging and describing nearly 3,000 files. The project comprises approximately 20 cubic feet of records, totaling over 2,000 work hours. Archiving was performed at the Jefferson County History Center located in the Jefferson College Library in Hillsboro, where the records will be stored for public viewing and access.

Although the collection consists of files from the 19th century, it is not complete. There are chronological gaps in the 1840s, the late 1870s, and mid-1880s to 1900. The collection is a valuable source for genealogical and historical research. The earliest file dates to 1820, shortly after the creation of Jefferson County, and the collection provides insight about the social, political, and economic relationships in the county throughout the 19th century. The majority of the cases are about debt and real estate, and offer researchers a valuable tool in understanding the 19th century economy and property rights, as well as important clues for genealogists.

The cases also involve other topics such as slavery, personal relationships, the Civil War in Missouri, and criminal activity, which reveal the complex history of Jefferson County.

The Jefferson College Library, which is open to the public, recently underwent a \$5 million renovation. New and improved features of the Library include increased access

to technology; an expanded Jefferson County History Center; more quiet and collaborative spaces; efficient, safe, sustainable, and accessible construction and furnishings; designated space for early childhood education collection; a larger bibliographic instruction room; and additional electrical outlets and device stations.

"Chasing the Moon" Preview Event June 13 at Library Celebrates 50th Anniversary of Moon Landing

In partnership with PBS, the Jefferson College Library will host an exclusive sneak preview of the new documentary series, "Chasing the Moon," a film by multi-awardwinning, Oscar-nominated and Emmy-nominated filmmaker Robert Stone, about the space race, from its earliest beginnings to the monumental achievement of the first lunar landing in 1969 and beyond.



The event celebrates the 50th Anniversary of the Apollo 11 Moon Landing with an exclusive sneak preview. It will be held on Thursday, June 13, from noon-1:30 p.m. in the first floor Collaborative



Space of the Library on the Hillsboro campus.

There is no admission cost. Reservations are not required. The program is suitable for all ages.



The 30-minute preview of "Episode 2: Saving 1968," explores the Saturn V mission, the contributions of Poppy Northcutt (NASA's first female engineer in an operational role in the Apollo Mission Control) and the launch of Apollo 8. A panel discussion by members of the St Louis Astronomical Society and a questionanswer session will follow the preview.

In addition to the exclusive showing, there will be information about the Library's telescope check-outs and an opportunity for attendees to share their "I remember when..." personal memories of the moon landing. Participants may also view a display of NASA government documents from the Library's Federal Depository collection and check out books about the night sky.

PACE Series Summer Musical "Chicago" June 14-16 and 21-23



As the final event in the Jefferson College 2018-19 PACE (Performing Arts and Cultural Enrichment) series, a cast of 28 students, community members and staff will present the summer musical production of "Chicago" directed by Communication and Theatre Professor Dr. Rebecca Ellison.

The story is a satire on corruption in the administration of criminal justice and the concept of the "celebrity" criminal." Set in the legendary city during the roaring "jazz hot" 1920s, Chicago tells the story of two rival vaudevillian murderesses locked up in Cook County Jail. Nightclub star Velma is serving time for killing her husband and sister after finding the two in bed together. Chorus girl, Roxie, has been jailed for killing the lover she's been cheating on her husband with. Not one to rest on her laurels, Velma enlists the help of prison matron Mama Morton and lawyer Billy Flynn, who turn Velma's incarceration into a murder-of-the-week media frenzy, preparing the world for a splashy showbiz comeback. However, Roxie has some of her own tricks up her sleeve. Neither woman will be outdone in their fight against each other and the public for fame and celebrity.

Performances are scheduled for Friday-Saturday, June 14-15, at 7 p.m., Sunday, June 16, at 2 p.m., and Friday-Saturday, June 21-22, at 7 p.m., and Sunday, June 23, at 2 p.m. in the air conditioned Fine Arts Theatre on the Hillsboro campus. The show contains adult language and adult situations.

Individual event tickets are \$5 for adults and \$2 for students/senior citizens/matinee shows.
