College Joins Degrees When Due – National Initiative Strengthens Pathways for Those with College Credits But No Degree




Jefferson College has been selected to join Degrees When Due, a national initiative of the Institute for Higher Education Policy (IHEP), to help students who have some college credits but have not completed their degree.

The College is making a concerted effort to eliminate existing degree completion gaps and help students, regardless of their economic backgrounds, improve their future through education. As one of the colleges and universities from 24 states participating in Degrees When Due, Jefferson College is employing best practices in degree reclamation and providing targeted support while re-engaging students who have paused (or "stopped out") of their studies.

Many students find hurdles in their path to degree completion. Low income, first generation, and minority students are most likely to encounter difficulties and stop out before earning a degree.

Participating campuses undergo a nine-month online learning experience complete with guided lessons in degree reclamation implementation and live coaching from expert practitioners.



"I'm very excited that Jefferson College is part of the Degrees When Due initiative. By re-engaging those who are close to completion, we're helping both our students and our local employers who rely on the College to develop an educated workforce," said College President Dr. Raymond Cummiskey. "As an open-door institution, we serve students from all social and economic backgrounds with varying stages of academic preparation. This means we have a higher proportion of students with fewer resources to handle unexpected life circumstances. Not all students are in a situation to complete a degree from start to finish with no breaks. Reaching out and reminding them that they can return and complete their degree is important."

Jefferson College's participation in the initiative is facilitated through the Missouri Department of Higher Education and Workforce Development. Currently, Missouri's attainment rate for degree completion is 38 percent with a goal of 60 percent completion across the state by 2025.



Degrees When Due is providing Jefferson College access to a variety of resources that help more students complete their degrees, while helping the institution audit students' previously earned and transfer credits to determine the most efficient pathway to graduation. The program will benefit the more than 75,600 individuals in Missouri who have been identified as having some college credits, but no awarded degree.

"National research indicates that 22 percent of Missourians have some credit but have not achieved a high quality certificate or degree," said Jefferson College Interim Dean of Academic Services and Chief Academic Officer Allan Wamsley. "We are working at the College to change this outcome. We believe this is an exceptional initiative, and are pleased to be part of this program working to help close this gap for county and Missouri residents."

"Our Degrees When Due institutional and state partners are building a strong pathway to degree attainment for all students, including by providing an on-ramp for those who have paused their studies or 'stopped-out," said IHEP President Michelle Asha Cooper, Ph.D. "IHEP enthusiastically welcomes the selected institutions and states to this effort. Through this initiative, they will increase student success, serve a diverse set of student populations, and join us in addressing one of higher education's most pressing challenges: degree completion."

President Cummiskey to Receive PTK Lifetime Achievement Award

The awards are given to retiring college presidents who have shown strong support of student success on their campus by recognizing academic achievement, leadership, and service among high-achieving students over the course of their career. Recipients are nominated by the students on their campus.

The award is named in honor of the late Dr. Michael Bennett, longtime president of St. Petersburg College in Florida.

Phi Theta Kappa is the premier honor society recognizing the academic achievement of students at associate degree-granting colleges and helping them to grow as scholars and leaders. The society is made up of more than 3.5 million members and nearly 1,300 chapters in 11 nations, with approximately 240,000 active members in the nation's colleges.

Free Adult Education and Literacy Classes for High School Equivalency

Each year, Jefferson College serves more than 200 individuals as Missouri is one of the nation's top high school equivalency (HiSET) programs in an effort to promote workforce development and employment opportunities.

The Jefferson College Adult Education and Literacy program is a free resource to the community and is the only Department of Elementary and Secondary Education approved program in Jefferson County.



Through the program, students are able to earn their HSE (formerly GED), prepare for college classes, participate in training programs, transition into employment, and learn better English. There is no cost to participate as funds for the program are provided through the federal Adult Education Act.

Jefferson College offers Adult Education and Literacy/HSE classes during the day and evening at the main campus in Hillsboro (1000 Viking Drive), at Jefferson College Arnold (1687 Missouri State Road) and at the Jefferson County Library Northwest Branch in High Ridge (5680 State Road PP). When a person is ready to begin class, they must first complete an orientation then meet with an instructor to design a personalized plan of study to help the student reach his/her goals.



When an individual is ready to take the HiSET exam, assistance may also be available to cover the testing fee.

In addition to free HiSET preparation, the Jefferson College Adult Education and Literacy program also provides additional services at no cost:



English Language Learners (ELL): This free service provides instruction for English Language Learners and offers individual and small group instruction. Call for more information about the next scheduled ELL orientation.

Adult Literacy Program: This free service assists adults with fundamental reading skills and matches students with their own personal tutor for individualized instruction.

Missouri Fast Track Workforce Incentive Grant Info Sessions -Never Too Late to Earn a Degree from Jefferson College

In connection with the new Missouri Fast Track Workforce Incentive Grant, Jefferson College will hold two free information sessions for those interested in learning more about the state-funded financial aid program designed to help adults pursue a certificate, degree, or industry-recognized credential. Pre-registration is not required.



The first session will be held on Wednesday, February 19, in the Student Center Viking Room on the Hillsboro campus beginning at 6 p.m.

The **second** will be held on **Wednesday**, **March 4**, at Jefferson College Arnold – Room 115 beginning at 6 p.m.

An additional information session, hosted by the Missouri Department of Higher Education and Workforce Development, will be held on Saturday, March 21, from noon-1 p.m. at the Jefferson County Library-Northwest Branch in High Ridge.



Fast Track is helping Missouri to meet the goal of having 60 percent of working-age adults possess a high quality certificate or degree by 2025.

Whether it is a student's first time to enroll or if they started a degree but never finished, Fast Track can be a new start. The grant program is open to those who are 25 or older or those who have not been enrolled in any educational program with the past two years and who have not earned a bachelor's degree and are planning to attend part-time or full-time. Individuals who make no more than \$80,000 per year filing jointly or no more than \$40,000 per year filing any other tax status can apply.


At Jefferson College, Fast Track programs of study include Associate of Science degree, Associate of Arts in Teaching degree, and Associate of Applied Science or Certificate in: Accounting, Applied Technology, Automotive Technology, Computer Information Systems - Computer Support, Computer Integrated Manufacturing, EMT/ Paramedic, Health Information Technology, Heating, Refrigeration, and Air Conditioning, Nursing, Occupational Therapy Assistant, Physical Therapist Assistant, Radiologic Technology, Veterinary Technology, and Welding.

The Fast Track grant is designed to ensure, when combined with other governmental financial aid, that tuition and fees are fully covered. Awards will be used for any remaining tuition and fees not covered by other state and federal student aid programs. Students who have their full tuition and fees covered by other aid are eligible for an award of up to \$500 to cover other education-related expenses.

The grant may be renewed for up to four semesters by meeting all of the initial requirements and by making satisfactory progress, which includes maintaining a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.5 (on a 4.0 scale).

In order to avoid the grant being converted to a loan, participants must maintain at least part-time enrollment in an eligible program, graduate from an approved institution, verify residency in Missouri for 12 months after graduation and maintain residency for at least three years, and secure qualifying employment within 12 months of graduation and maintain employment for at least three years.

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
PACE Series Comedic Play "Crazytown" Feb 27-March 1

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
