Using the Academic Planner

Keep your Academic Planner, and update it every semester until you earn your AAT.

- Updating this planner will help ensure that you complete the necessary requirements to earn your degree.
- Use the planner to help you determine the courses in which you should enroll each semester. Then, meet with one of the Teacher
 Education Program faculty to review your plans <u>before registering</u> for classes for next semester.
- We do NOT intend for the planner to substitute for meeting with a teacher education faculty advisor.

Steps to Complete Your AAT Academic Planner

Use a **pencil** to complete your planner.

- 1. Fill in general information.
 - At the <u>top</u>, print your name, the date, and the name of your **four-year institution** where you plan to transfer.
 - At the bottom, mark your intended initial area(s) of certification.

Significance of Four-Year Program/Certification

Your plans in terms of these two items will **determine** some of the **courses** you need to take while at Jefferson College.

You should obtain a copy of the **transfer guide** from **Jefferson College to your four-year program** as soon as possible for reference when choosing some classes for your AAT.

- Thorough guides for students transferring to Missouri Baptist University and UMSL are linked from the Jefferson College website.
 - On <u>www.jeffco.edu</u>, click on **Academics** and then **University Partnerships** or the name of the institution.
- You should also contact a **representative** from your **four-year program** as soon as possible to chart your path into their program.
- Indicate completed courses and current courses.

 - b. For each course you are taking **NOW**: Mark an **X** in the box in the **SP20** column.

Additional General Education Hours: Option List

In order to earn the **minimum 62 credits** for your degree, you need to take **five (5)** additional **credit hours** (*not* five classes) from **courses that fulfill general education requirements**. Ways that you can fulfill this requirement include the following.

- If you take both **natural science** courses from the **sciences list** in this resource **with labs**, you will have more than the seven (7) required hours for science. The additional hours can count for this requirement.
- If you take multiple civics course from HST103, HST104, and PSC102, you can count the hours from the additional course(s).
- If you take *multiple* math courses from **MTH130**, **MTH131**, **MTH132**, **MTH134**, and **MTH141**, you can count the hours from the additional course(s).
- You can use surplus humanities hours by taking another course (beyond 3) in the list or from five-hour language courses.

Notes About General Education Requirements

- Math: Complete needed classes every semester through your final requirement. (Do not skip any semesters.)
- o Natural Sciences: Take two natural science courses, one with a lab (usually BIO101), as they fit into your schedule.
- Humanities: Take three courses from at least two areas (art, literature, etc.) as they fit into your schedule.
 - See note above regarding EDU240 and EDU245 fulfilling humanities requirements.
- o **Communication**: In addition to ENG101, take ENG102 and COM100/COM110 as they fit in your schedule.
- Social and Behavioral Sciences
 - ❖ Take PSY101 as soon as possible because it is a prerequisite for required courses PSY205 and EDU225.
 - ❖ Take either HST103 US History I, HST104 US History II, or PSC102 US and Missouri Governments and Constitutions as it fits into your schedule.
- Consider requirements specified by your four-year program.

General Information

- Students must achieve a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.75, and a minimum GPA of 2.75 in EDU classes in order to earn the AAT.
 - O However, students should strive to earn a much higher GPA than the minimum to enhance their opportunities for future employment.
 - o Four-year institutions may offer transfer scholarships for students with a cumulative GPA of at least 3.25 or 3.5. Students should check with individual institutions for more information.
- Students should strive to earn an A (or at least a B) in all courses.
- Students must earn a final semester grade of C or better in all education courses.
- Students must earn at least the passing minimum score on each section of the Missouri General Education Assessment (MoGEA).
 - ★ Students initially take the assessment during the semester they are enrolled in Foundations of Education (EDU210).
- Note: Some four-year transfer institutions may have additional requirements, including a higher GPA or higher MoGEA scores.
